Should our church have a dance team to praise God?

- 1) There is a worship dance and a sensual dance mentioned in the Bible, but the Bible does not describe the difference in the two with David's being the worshipful dance and the children of Israel when Moses was on the mountain being the sensual dance (Exodus 32). In the latter case, they were worshipping Jehovah, according to Aaron, but it was not a pure thing by the context. David's dance, though not condemned in the Bible, certainly caused jealousy on the part of his wife, which would lead me to believe it could have been taken as sensual even if that was not the intent.
- 2) The dance described in the Bible is more of a spontaneous leaping rather than a choreographed experience. It appears that it was leaping from overwhelming joy not something made up! One writer says it could be a joyful trembling in worship - Joy contrasted with mourning. Yet they say it appears that a worship dance was approved in Psalms 149 and 150. Psalms 150 presents a problem for me because it is listed with musical instruments and seems to be inconsistent to say it is not an instrument but I can find no proof that it is.
- 3) We also must consider the principle of association (II Corinthians 6:17). Though it may have been an accepted practice in Bible days and have a good connotation, it certainly does not have that for us. Since we do not have a Biblical mandate to do so (Unless you consider Psalms 149 and 150 a mandate), then we should abstain from questionable activities.
- 4) I believe it would be "nearly" impossible to accomplish dance without sensual movements involved. This clearly would be wrong.
